

## HEALTH & WELLBEING

### HEALTHWATCH DEVON

In 2012 an organisation totally focused on the consumer experience of health and social care services was merely a concept when Devon County Council awarded Devon Communities Together (DCT) the contract to develop Healthwatch Devon (HWD).

The challenge was, over a three year period, to create a new sustainable organisation whilst developing and delivering the new HWD service.

- Key achievements in 2015-16, the final year of the contract, included enabling 4000 people to share their experiences of health and social care, including 600 young people and supporting 100 older people in Care Homes to speak about their care.
- Reaching 22,000 people with online information and advice and working with our Engagement Partners providing feedback to commissioners on 30 separate health and care topics. Reports were published on a range of subjects including *Leaving Hospital* and *Primary Care Services* and young people were helped to produce a series of mental health films.

Our final achievement took place in March 2016 when HWD was successfully floated as an independent organisation.

## DEVON OIL COLLECTIVE

The Devon Oil Collective (DOC) was launched in 2012 as a response to the high levels of fuel poverty in rural Devon. With much of the County being off the mains gas network, vulnerable households were paying high prices to try and maintain a decent living environment. Through the power of collective bulk buying the costs of heating oil for DOC members have been reduced with members seeing the benefits year on year.

The last year saw oil prices falling generally and even in this more competitive environment our 270 DOC members have saved about £12,000 when comparing our oil prices with the market averages.

With the prospect of oil prices starting to rise again the benefits of DOC membership are likely to be even greater in the coming months. We are also looking at other ways we can support DOC members with discounts on a range of products and services.

## GATHERING INTELLIGENCE

**The Impact of Welfare Reform on the health and wellbeing of vulnerable individuals in Devon.**

**AN EXAMPLE:**



In 2015, Devon Communities Together (DCT) was commissioned by Devon County Council to build on a previous piece of research into the effects of changes to the welfare system by undertaking a Prevention and Need Action Research Project.

The research collated both quantitative and qualitative data for anonymous case studies. These studies from 13 Devon voluntary sector organisations related to the health and well-being impact on their clients as a direct result of implementation of welfare reform legislation.

This is only one of many examples of DCT being able to utilise its extensive communication reach across the county to gather and analyse strategic intelligence. The commissioner of this research from Devon County Council said:

*"I see this work contributing not only to the County Council's Care Act responsibilities in terms of identifying 'unmet need' but it can inform many developing policy areas"*

## NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

In 2015-16, Devon Communities Together (DCT) provided direct support and advice to **20** Neighbourhood Planning groups with:

- Forming a steering group and designing terms of reference
- Applying for grants
- Producing project plans and budgets
- Presenting an overview of Neighbourhood Planning at community meetings, town and parish council meetings
- Guidance on appropriate community engagement
- Community surveys and data analysis

AN EXAMPLE:

We helped the Brixton Neighbourhood Planning Group to design a robust community survey. DCT analysed the data and our team helped to organise a family-friendly event to present the results to the Community.

Recognised for our local connections and influence, DCT was invited by the Department for Communities and Local Government to host a local Neighbourhood Planning roadshow in conjunction with CPRE Devon.

**145** delegates attended making it the largest roadshow of its kind in the country.

## RURAL FUTURES CONFERENCE 2015

Our annual rural futures conference tackles topical issues effecting Devon .

Entitled *More Than a Place to Live* the 2015 conference examined the impact of social housing on communities and asked what is needed to make the places we live in more vibrant and sustainable.

The conference was led by Key Note Speaker Lord Best OBE DL. It was hosted by The Met Office, sponsored by Wickstead Playgrounds and supported by 20 exhibitors.

Delegates from all over Devon, representing Councils, organisations and communities were engaged and impressed by the range of topics and calibre of speakers.

Media coverage was provided by BBC Spotlight and Radio Devon throughout the day.

## DEVON OPEN DATA WORKING GROUP

In 2015, Devon Communities Together (DCT) initiated and began hosting a multi- agency working group, made up of partners interested in exploring ways of harnessing the benefits of open data for the benefit of Devon communities.

The Devon Open Data Working Group has 14 members, including Devon County Council; Exeter and Plymouth City Councils; Devon District Councils; Devon Communities Together; Exeter University; Healthwatch Devon; COSMIC; Co- Cars; Dartmoor National Park Authority.

The Group has been looking at practical applications for open data to support community activity and the needs of individuals in rural areas, particularly those who are vulnerable; elderly, disabled, unwell or isolated.

A pilot project was developed which focused on community transport and access to primary health and care services in the absence of a single repository of open source data for community led transport in Devon.

In partnership with Q - Step at Exeter University, DCT has hosted an undergraduate student on placement to progress this work.

## ECONOMY & ENTERPRISE



### SOCIAL ENTERPRISE 121 ADVICE SERVICE

Thanks to continuing funding from our partners, we deliver free advice to community organisations and businesses and local councils looking to set up or grow a local service or facility.

Over 40 organisations were supported during the year. Notable trends included: a growth in setting up Community Interest Companies (CICs); community take-over of public sector services eg libraries, youth centres and day centres; development of multi-use community owned assets; creative arts, well-being and veteran support initiatives.

### DEVON SOCIAL ENTERPRISE NETWORK (DSEN)

DSEN was launched in summer 2015, aimed at social entrepreneurs and supporters of the Social Enterprise movement in Devon.

Membership has grown to over 150. There is a members' area of useful resources on our website and a Facebook page which also encourages peer to peer support. We are a member of the South West Social Enterprise Special Interest Group.

### FUNDING COMMUNITY ENTERPRISE

We provide support and training to communities planning a community enterprise. Here are two examples:

- In partnership with the national organisation Pub is the Hub (PITH) we launched a campaign of awareness raising and support for pubs in Devon wanting to diversify their facilities and services to better meet the needs of their local community.
- Our training event, *Funding Your Community Enterprise* for community activists and social entrepreneurs was attended by 22 participants. The course focussed on encouraging enterprise and trade to ensure sustainability.

### GET UP TO SPEED

Get up to **SPEED**

Working with our partners from Peninsula Enterprise and Cosmic Ethical IT, this work was about supporting the 'roll out' of superfast broadband under the Connecting Devon and Somerset Programme. Devon Communities Together raised local awareness of the programme through our communications channels, our website, publications, emails, social media, networks and events.

We also gave presentations in 6 community venues across the county based on the Digital Villages Toolkit and bringing the world of broadband potential alive for community members.

Aimed at anyone from beginners upwards the sessions demonstrated how to harness digital technology to support Parish Councils, Committees and Community Organisations.

### WOMEN LED ENTERPRISE



**27** different Hub meetings were run in market towns across Devon.

A total of **345** women Entrepreneurs participated.

This contract was delivered by Devon Communities Together (DCT) and our delivery partners in Somerset – The Fruit Tree for Business as part of the Rural Growth Network partnership and pilot programme.

The project ran for 20 months up to December 2015

### AFFORDABLE HOUSING

**78** affordable homes were let to local families

**11,500** households received surveys and information

Devon Communities Together (DCT) continues to host the Devon Rural Housing Partnership. The DRHP facilitates the development of affordable housing in rural areas.

In 2015 Lord Richard Best addressed the DCT Rural Futures Conference:

*"Land owners and local businesses as well as local residents are recognising more and more that affordable housing is essential if rural communities are to thrive economically and socially in the years to come."*

This year our work contributed to 78 affordable houses being completed and let to local families, including 6 new affordable homes in Dalwood, East Devon.

## SOCIAL IMPACT

### DEVON COMMUNITY RESILIENCE BOARD (DCRB)

#### OUR VISION

To work with communities and individuals to develop and enhance their ability to harness local resources and expertise, to help themselves plan for, respond to and recover from emergencies.

Encouraging communities to create a local Community Emergency Plan is a prime objective of the DCRB.

#### Be Prepared . Respond . Recover

Devon has established the DCRB comprising members from the Local Authority, the Environment Agency and the Emergency Services. The Board is a strategic group working across Devon, coordinating Community Resilience activity, learning lessons and ensuring best use of resources

Last year Devon Communities Together (DCT) was invited to join the DCRB with the specific task of developing a Devon Community Resilience Forum to support communities with Community Emergency Planning. The Forum enables dialogue between communities and relevant agencies, so that communities can raise issues and receive advice and support.

The Forum now has a membership of 240 individuals and has held two very successful events attended by 150 delegates with over 40 communities represented at each event.

DCT also manages the Devon Emergency Flood Resilience Fund (provided by Devon County Council) which has awarded £30,000 in grants to communities across Devon for the immediate alleviation of flood risk.

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#### WHY DOES IT MATTER?

Creating Social Impact is what Devon Communities Together (DCT) is all about.

Funded by an Impact Readiness Grant from Social Investment Business, we have been working with consultants from Investing for Good with the goal of improving the way we measure, articulate and report on the impact we make. It starts from the Theory of Change.

#### WHAT IS A THEORY OF CHANGE?

A detailed picture of how a desired change is expected to happen. It looks behind why and how an organisation creates impact.

An organisation first looks at its intended long term goals (impacts) and then examines activities, outputs and outcomes that need to be delivered along the way.

Having completed the groundwork in the summer of 2016 we will introduce a full Impact Measurement System of DCT's Strategic Objectives in spring 2017

The result will be an evaluation methodology designed to measure the overall impact of our work and a clearer demonstration of the link between our activities and our long-term goals.



## DEVON REMEMBERS

**£150K** investment on the restoration of over 70 memorials

The Devon Remembers project continues to commemorate and remember all those affected by the First World War from Devon communities.

DCT managed a grant fund to renovate war memorials dedicated to those who died as a result of the First World War.

## COMMUNITY CAPACITY BUILDING (CCB)

Devon Communities Together (DCT) has been chairing a partnership of emergency services, local authorities and other agencies across Devon and Cornwall on a CCB.

The vision was to work jointly with communities, developing and mentoring them to become more self-resilient, reduce risk, save life and improve wellbeing.

Our work with communities confirmed that they are able to mobilise local volunteers and the best way we can support them is with:


- Reduced bureaucracy – eg the need for specific training before signs can be put out on the highway
- Clarity about liability – eg if a member of the public misuses a defibrillator and someone decided to make a claim against them
- Bespoke training – eg. some form of conflict management for those wishing to assist in community affairs
- Practical resources – Shovels, pumps, grit


