


Introduction

Who We Are:

- Largest non-metropolitan fire service in England
- We have 83 fire stations and nearly 2,000 staff
- We attend around 17,000 calls annually
- Working alongside local authorities, Police, Ambulance, Environment Agency, and voluntary groups







Statutory Duties

Extinguish Fires

Respond to fires to protect life, property, and the environment.

Rescue People from Danger

Road accidents, floods, storms, industrial incidents.

Fire Safety & Prevention

Inspect non-domestic buildings and provide safety advice.

Emergency Planning & Resilience

Prepare for large-scale emergencies; work with other agencies.

Regulatory Functions

Enforce fire safety laws; investigate fire causes.











Response Priorities

During disruptive events we will focus on:

- Saving life & protecting people
- Protecting property & critical infrastructure
- Maintaining operational effectiveness
- Collaborating with other agencies
- Facilitating recovery



Flood Response

- Rescue people trapped in vehicles & homes
- Pump flood water away
- Assist with evacuations
- Coordinate with local authorities



Community Preparedness

How Communities Can Help:

- Stay informed via Environment Agency flood alerts & Met
 Office warnings
- Know how to turn off gas, electricity, and water
- Keep emergency kits (torch, prescriptions)
- Check on vulnerable neighbours



Working Together

Partners in Action:

- Local Authorities (rest centres)
- Environment Agency (flood defences, warnings)
- Police (public safety, evacuation support)
- NHS & Ambulance (health response)
- Voluntary organisations (e.g. Red Cross, 4x4 groups)

Fire Service is here for life safety and emergency support

 We can't stop floods or storms – but we can reduce their impact
