COMF Large Grant Funding and Digital Inclusion

Introduction

AS part of the Governments strategy to support communities through the Covid winter of 2021/22 funding was released via a Covid Outbreak Management Fund (COMF). DCT successfully partnered with DeVA and were awarded two grants to deliver two projects:

- Digital Inclusion Partnership
- Large Grants administration of £165 000

Projects

Digital Inclusion Project

Aim to help 100 of the hardest to reach people become digitally inclusive through developing a network of Digital Befrienders.

The project was developed in partnership with Wellmoor Community Health (North Dartmoor), Teignbridge CVS and Netfriends – a social enterprise providing affordable IT support.



The project achieved all its objectives and Netfriends have just accepted a donation of devices from Torbay Primary care trust that is in its 100's of pieces of equipment that will help take the project forward.

Large Grants

An application structure was put in place within two weeks of receiving the project go ahead and a grant panel consisting of DCT, DeVa and DCC / Health England was established to review applications.

Key Achievements

Digital Inclusion

- Over 100 hard to reach people trained in using the internet
- A network of 20 digital befrienders has been trained
- Over 40 Digital Donations distributed to people
- Over 30 organisations engaged across 4 regions of Devon

Large Grants - Impact

9 Grants were awarded with a total value of £165000 to a range of organisations across Devon:

Large Grants Key Achievements and Impact

- Over 500 nights emergency winter accommodation were provided in the Torridge area at a time of high Covid rates
- 150 people received financial advice and support in mid Devon area

- Over 260 people engaged with Mental Health celebration events and support days
- Age UK opened an new Exeter service and have supported an initial 60 people.
- Project food supplied over 145 boxes and 200 meals to people in food poverty and in addition undertook a tour of schools to provide information of healthy eating.
- Homestart Exeter supported 100 families in the Exeter area with support and advice
- Over 1000 children received workshops on actions to prevent suicide with another 3000 children planned.
- Dough Bro's have invested in a new wood fired pizza oven and are supporting mental health through a range of workshops leading to employment.

Lessons Learnt


Projects were delivered to tight deadlines and required organisations to react extremely quickly.

The project paid grants in arrears and this led to some projects being difficult or slow to start as it required some small organisations to use their reserves. Ability to pay organisations in advance would be beneficial.

Areas to Develop

These projects were aimed at Covid support and in emerging from the Winter many of the issues have not been resolved and are still embedded in our communities.

There a wide range of people who are still not digitally included. At a time when services such as health are increasingly only delivered on-line many people suffering from mental and physical health are being excluded.



Conclusion

Both projects provided community support overt the winter of 2021 / 22 and successfully achieved their targets and outcomes. Suffering was alleviated, hunger abated and support provided to the most vulnerable.
