ZEROING IN ON DEVON'S WASTE

Sustainability, green, eco - whichever terms we use, the drive to protect and conserve the natural environment is high on the national and international agenda, and here in Devon we're lucky enough to have plenty of passionate people and great initiatives...but we can all still do more ...



ZERO WASTE

Zero waste is an environmental buzz phrase that's gaining momentum internationally and in Devon it's no different. Zero waste is about people and organisations mimicking the way resources are recycled and reused in nature, ensuring that nothing that we use is wasted and everything has a purpose.

Zero waste advocate Faye Jennings-Mosquera owns Zero Exeter, a zero waste shop in Exeter's Fore Street, which opened in April 2019. "We want to show people it can be easier to live a zero waste lifestyle than they think," she says of the shop, which stocks an eclectic mix of entirely zero waste food, interiors and lifestyle products and is designed to be an accessible, welcoming hub for those who want to make positive changes. "Our products are beautiful, affordable and locally sourced as well as being zero waste. We have collaborated with local makers to provide lots of wonderful

ways to make big strides towards a zero waste lifestyle." The shop is family friendly with a colouring station for children and delicate products placed strategically out of reach of little hands. It features late night and early morning opening, braille signage, workshops and the promise of a non-judgmental atmosphere.

A close neighbour of Faye on Exeter's Fore Street is Sancho's, an ethical fashion enterprise run by Kalkidan Legesse. The store and its online site has always championed sustainable clothing made from natural fibres and in 2019 Sancho's launched a new zero waste range of accessories, beauty products, sanitary products and more. "The zero waste range has been really popular so far and products regularly sell out - it proves there is a local appetite to buy into this lifestyle," said Kalkidan. "We're quite a niche group in Devon at the moment but we're

WHAT'S DCT DOING?

Here at Devon Communities Together we have established an environmental working group to come up with ideas and policies to make DCT more sustainable. We started by making small changes such as swapping our plastic milk bottles for locally supplied glass bottles and we have big plans to work towards a completely paper-free office. We're also working with the Devon village hall network and our partner, Smarti, to conserve water using Smarti's waterfree urinal technology (see page 16).

growing and so is local awareness of the issues. For example, microplastics have always been a problem but now more people understand what they are and the damage they cause. That's why we only work with makers of natural, organic clothing; man-made fibres push plastics into our oceans every time they're washed." This also extends to Sancho's self-designed range, created because consumers deserve "beautiful, size-inclusive, affordable fashion."

Both Fave and Kalkidan have arrived in Devon as relative newcomers - Faye from Wales and Kalkidan from Ethiopia - but both are now a firm part of the county's burgeoning zero waste community, which is represented all over Devon. KALKIDAN LEGESSE SHARES HER ADVICE ON LEADING A MORE SUSTAINABLE LIFESTYLE...

Consume less - buy fewer clothes, less packaged food and drink.

Look at your lifestyle and take one element at a time. E.g. what are you <u>collecting most of</u> in your recycling bin? Once you've worked it out, buy less.

Take more care over your shopping choices. Zero waste products can be beautiful. luxurious, affordable and functional - they're often actually better than what you were using before!

REFILL DEVON

Refill Devon is a campaign which aims to stem the tide of single-use plastic bottle pollution by making Devon a county in which refilling your water bottle becomes a cultural norm. To do this they are trying to encourage businesses and organisations across Devon to sign-up to become Refill Stations. This means that people can go into any of these participating outlets and fill up a bottle with water for free, cutting down on the amount of single use plastic bottles being brought. Participating businesses are added to the Refill app and there are currently almost 700 Refill Stations across Devon!

It's easy, healthy, cheap and aims to reduce the amount of plastic bottles ending up in our oceans. And Devon is surrounded by amazing ocean - what's not to love?

Exploring your interests, forging a career, earning money, fulfilling your potential - these are challenges faced by all young people but can sometimes be even tougher in rural communities, where opportunities may be limited.

Research shows that rural areas have a lower percentage of 16-34 year-olds and evidence suggests that young people can choose to move away from rural areas because of a lack of education or employment opportunities, and issues around housing and public transport. Yet a study from the Resilience Research Centre suggests that many of these young people would actually prefer to stay in more rural locations for a less stressful lifestyle, more open space and sense of community.

At Devon Communities Together we're committed, both in our own organisation and through local projects and partnerships, to provide opportunities to young people for apprenticeships, training and work experience which allow them to take positive steps towards their future careers within their own communities, if they choose to stay.

Meet just a few of the young people DCT has supported ...

We've so far employed three Marketing Apprentices here at DCT, including our current apprentice, Naomi. Fiona and Isaac completed their courses with flying colours and our latest 'graduate', Fiona, who finished her level 2 apprenticeship in 2018, is now working for a local digital marketing company!

We've also recently recruited a new Trainee Rural Officer, Natasha, who is working across the organisation to get a thorough grounding in rural issues and community development. Look our for her in your community soon!

We're lucky enough to work with some wonderful work experience students and volunteers. Recent success stories



include Robert, who joined us from Exeter City Community Trust's Train to Succeed programme. Rob was facing a number of barriers to work but successfully completed 100 hours with us, assisting with our digital marketing and administration.

Having initially been very hesitant about work experience, Robert, who hopes to become a computer

We also work with educational establishments to facilitate placements for academic students who require workplace experience. We've recently been joined by several students from the University of Exeter, including Will and Holly, who've done some great work investigating our work processes and our impact in communities.

CONNECTING ACTIVELY TO NATURE



We're very lucky in Devon to have so many wonderful locations in which to get active - whether that's a gentle woodland walk or something a bit more adrenaline fuelled! LOVE Devon spoke to Exmouth's Shelly Stammers, who set up the Tri-hards - a local community group - about her love of the great outdoors, staying active and finding a community through a shared hobby.

Tell us a bit about yourself ... I have recently turned 40 and I'm a mum of two boys Brad, 19, and Jay, 11. I have lived in Exmouth on and off for around 25 years with my husband Neal, having been born in the Midlands. I run a childcare setting from a farm for children under 5, which is a very active job in itself. My hobbies include running, cycling, swimming, sea swimming, netball... whatever I can get stuck into!

How did the Tri-hards come about? It all

started in June 2017 when I set up a bike ride for me and two friends. My husband had recently taken part in a charity cycle from John O'Groats to Lands End on a flash new road bike. When he arrived home I asked for a go on his bike. From just a short ride down the street I was shocked at how much easier and lighter his bike was to ride than my bask bike. So... Mrs Impulsive (as many of my friends call me) within a week had a new road bike, the helmet, the lycra and all the gadgets. I rode out with my friends and we loved it. I then set up another ride and invited a few more friends. Within a week myself and Hannah Frame had decided we wanted to try swimming, so we had lessons booked with her brother who runs his own swim school. You know what's coming... we then started running! The first run was terrible, I couldn't get from the Rowing Club to RNLI without stopping! But we kept going and slowly improved.

I set up a private group on Facebook called Tri-hards and within seven days we had over 80 members! The meet-ups became regular, we started to enter events and Trihards began to really grow! We now have 1,800 women and over 300 men. Tri-hards has produced kit with the help of sponsors, we have put nine women and men on their Run Leader courses and also have a Cycling Leader and two Boxercise coaches. We have put over 160 people through their couch to 5k course since September 2018. The groups have become a health and wellbeing support community for Exmouth.

We have over 40 events happening a week, many of which are set up by members. They can be from a walk to a run, cycle, swim, coffee and cake etc. We also attend the Exmouth parkrun and help with the volunteering roles.

Having come such a long way in such a short space of time, what's next for the Tri-hards? We are in the process of setting

GET INVOLVED WITH CAN!

Inspired by the Tri-hards? Devon Communities Together is now recruiting volunteer ambassadors for the CAN project and is encouraging anyone over the age of 50 with a keen interest in keeping active and/or nature to get in touch.

In Devon and Torbay there are over 122,000 people aged 55+ who are doing less than 30 minutes of physical activity each week, with over 43,000 people suffering from mental health problems. The CAN programme will help more people to enjoy the combined benefits of getting active outdoors and having a connection to nature.

CAN volunteer ambassadors will receive a regular bulletin from Devon Communities Together

up a Community Interest Company, asking members to pay a small membership fee (93p a week). Members will get access to online groups and a membership card with access to local discounts. We are hoping the membership structure will support Tri-hards to continue to grow and launch in other towns across Devon. We started as a triathlon group but have become much more of a wellbeing community for all ages, sizes and fitness levels.

What do you find are the benefits of group exercise outdoors eg fitness, social, wellbeing?

NOT THE TWO MOORS WAY

Sue Viccars goes 'off piste' on the South Moor

There's a wealth of interesting features near the Two Moors Way (TMW) on Harford and Ugborough moors...

Start/finish: Stowford Bridge, Ivybridge SX 641568 Distance: 7 1/2 miles (12.1km); shorter route 5 1/2 miles (8.8km) Time: 3 1/2 hours Terrain: Open moorland; old railway trackbed; no steep ascents/descents Toilets: None on route Parking: On Coles Lane near Stowford Bridge Public transport: Half-hourly Mon-Sat (hourly Sun) bus service to The Watermark (Plymouth-Torquay) in Ivybridge centre (follow TMW); train to lybridge station (signs to TMW)

Map: OS Explorer OL28 Dartmoor; OS Landranger 202 Torbay & South Dartmoor; Harvey Superwalker Dartmoor NOTE: Dogs on leads 1st March-31st July

1. SX 641568 Cross Stowford Bridge and head up Harford Lane. Opposite Stowford Farm turn right (bridleway); the track bends sharp left and ascends to a gate onto Harford Moor.

2. SX 645576 Take the middle of three grassy ways seen ahead, ascending gently. Reach a MW 2002 marker stone on the trackbed below Butterdon Hill.

3. SX 651582 Bear left along the track. The Red Lake Railway opened in 1911 to link china clay workings to the Cantrel Works at Bittaford, closing in the early 1930s. A straight stretch has craggy Hangershell Rock in its sights, below which the track bears left. To the right can be seen a line of low and widely spaced boundary stones.

4. SX 656598 The line of stones crosses the trackbed; turn left alongside the line (resembling broken teeth!). Shorter version: turn right and follow the line to Butterdon Hill: see Point 6. Ascend past Hobajohns Cross, a boundary marker, and later the Longstone (now recumbent), then cross the top of Piles Hill. The trackbed is regained at another boundary stone (H = Harford, U = Ugborough).



5. SX 654611 Turn right; follow the track south. On reaching a shallow pond (left) just before the track bears sharp right - bear left to find Spurrells Cross, situated at the iunction of old moorland tracks.

6. SX 659599 Turn right to re-meet the trackbed; bear left along it to Point 4 (Hangershell Rock straight ahead). Bear left and follow the stones uphill to the top of Butterdon Hill. Continue in the same direction (south), towards Western Beacon. Descend rocky ground to pass another Longstone and reach shallow Black Pool.

7. SX 655581 Turn left, downhill. Eventually bear right on a broad grassy way along the lower slopes of Western Beacon. Moorhaven Village comes into view below left. Keep descending gradually, soon paralleling a wall below left.

8. SX 658572 Look left to spot a gate (Cantrel Lane); just above that pick up the southern end of the trackbed, and head west along it, soon crossing a wide level area (former railway turntable). Where the tramway starts to bear sharp right and heads north, bear left across rough ground, eventually paralleling a wall, to reach the gate onto the moor. Retrace your steps to the start.

How did you all meet and form the band? We all began as solo performers, but we met at Mama Stones, a late-night music club in Exeter, where Leigh was already playing in a band. We would all hang out there on the weekends, and we got to know each other so well that we started to feel like family. We enjoyed singing together and decided to form a band. Richard came up with the name 'Club Brothers' to reflect how we spent our time socialising in the club and we felt as close as brothers.

How did you first start out? We started out by making YouTube videos of our performances. We also played at local artisan bars and cafes, to see what kind of reaction we got and to find out which songs were the keepers. We played our first gig at a pub in Exeter, the Old Firehouse, which was hot, sweaty and loads of fun! Once we had got our name out there, we started selling out more venues. The band is now our main focus and we love what we do for a living. We just want to create music that we enjoy playing, and that other people like listening to. We are not aiming for fame; we would rather just be happy and enjoy making music.

How would you describe your music? Is it influenced by your Devon roots? We describe our music as electroacoustic pop, but we take inspiration from a broad range of styles, including solo, jazz and country. Devon definitely influences the way that we see ourselves. We aren't consumed by the city culture of somewhere like London, where it's all 'dog eat dog'. Here in Devon, bands help one another. We are community-focused and like to support other musicians in the area. We rally together to promote each other's music and we are always happy to recommend other bands for gigs. It's a very friendly and supportive community here.

Do you give back to Devon in any other way? We've played events to support charities in Devon, for

example Cancer Research and the Exeter Leukaemia Fund. We also try to be environmentally aware - Richard recently gave up plastic for Lent!

VILLAGE HALLS GRANTS SCHEME

COULD YOUR BUILDING BE ELIGIBLE?

For many years the village halls movement has been lobbying for relief from VAT on improvement works to halls. In last year's Budget the Chancellor announced a new grants scheme to improve community buildings. The scheme has now been launched, with a £3 million fund to be administered by Action with Communities in Rural England (ACRE). The scheme will fund up to 20% of eligible costs, with a minimum grant of £10,000 and a maximum grant of £75,000. This means overall scheme costs would be between £50,000 and £375.000.

The aim of this grant funding is the updating and refurbishment of village halls so that they are

fit for purpose and provide activities which seek to achieve one or more of the following outcomes for their communities:

- Improved health and wellbeing/ reduction in loneliness
- Demonstrates a positive impact on the environment
- Supports the local rural economy

The fund is predominantly a 'finishing' grant, aimed at projects that have most of their funding in place. Details of eligibility and the application process are on the ACRE website: www.acre.org.uk

It is a two-stage application process and, whilst we have asked for the draft process to be made easier, halls may need help and advice on making applications. The scheme is time limited and so halls should not delay in preparing an application.

As grant funding has become increasingly hard to secure, particularly large sums for major projects, community organisations have been exploring loan funding as a means of achieving their goals. Parish Councils can support local projects by using the Public Works Loan Board and/or the local precept. Parish Councils can get more information from Devon Association of Local Councils (DALC); community groups should contact their parish clerk or our Community Projects Advisor for help.

AT THE FARM GATE

DCT Community Porjects Advisor Martin Rich shares a hidden gem he found on his extensive travels around Devon...

You can live well on the road. As I travel the byways of Devon to meet with communities and provide our services. I am tempted by roadside offers of eggs, honey, preserves, home produce, even bags of manure! Taking the old A30 out of Crockernwell towards Whiddon Down, my attention was drawn to a roadside board with the name 'Oinkers'. After passing the board on several journeys, my curiosity and the thought of something interesting for tea got the better of me, so I turned off the road to explore. A further arrow on a post directed me to Higher Fingle Farm. Oinkers' butchers shop and a large building under construction.

Higher Fingle Farm, set above the Teign Valley and looking towards Dartmoor, is a Devon County Council 'start-up' farm, tenanted by Colin and Kim Drake. Both from farming backgrounds, Colin and Kim decided they wanted to return to farming and saw the County scheme as a way in. They prepared a long-term business plan and cash-flow forecasts as part of a rigorous interview process and were eventually successful.

They have now developed a fully organic farm with sheep and cattle grazing on a gourmet selection of grasses and legumes. Colin aspired to sell his meat direct from the farm and started out with boxed deliveries and farmers' markets. When he heard that the established butchery of Oinkers was looking for a new home, the opportunity for a joint venture with Drewsteignton pig farmer Richard Dunning was a way to accelerate his ambitions. The former

poultry-dressing shed was converted into a butchery, initially opening on three days, but soon adding to the staff and opening Tuesday to Saturday. Their small shop is an Aladdin's Cave of local dairy, bakery, fruit and veg, eggs, preserves and craft produce.

Colin and Kim aspired to have a café on their farm and to give a 'farm to plate' experience. After conversations with chef Colin Wheeler-James of Ground Up Cookery, the the process of applying for funding and planning a building to house these enterprises got underway. The cookery school is promoting an exciting programme of tutorials and experiences, whilst the café is open Thursdays to Sundays and throughout the school holidays.

On the farm Kim is using her skills as a teacher to entertain school visits to help children understand the farming processes, the food chain and the management of the countryside. Colin has created a footpath link between the butchery, café and the adjacent Barley Meadow Touring Park, so the prospect of a holiday with dramatic scenery and the chance for tutelage by a top chef is a fine example of the special things Devon has to offer.

Behind that roadside board I found a burgeoning rural enterprise, promoting best practice in farming, an outlet for high quality local produce and products, a chance to learn about the countryside and to gain some cookery skills to impress your friends. It is providing quality employment in a very rural area and helping to drive the local economy.

NATIONAL CITIZEN SERVICE



National Citizen Service (NCS) is government funded programme aimed at 15-17 year olds. Petroc is just one of the National providers of NCS, recruiting from all local schools within the North Devon area. It is a 4-week long programme based over the summer (after GCSEs) and is designed to encourage growth, personal development and guidance towards independence.

Week One/Adventure - A 5 day, 4 night stay at an outdoor residential centre. Learn the importance of team building, communication and challenges. Get involved with activities such coasteering, rock climbing, paddle sports, etc.

Week Two/Discovery- Stay away from home in local hostels, B+B and residential centres. Each team will be given a £200 budget to cook for themselves and you will attend various college-based workshops on life skills such as: first aid, driving skills, cooking, motivational talks, 3D printing, etc. Start thinking about your 'Social Action Project'.

Week Three/Action- Based at home with travel to Petroc College where you will spend this week finalising your Social Action Project/Community Project.

Week Four/Action- You'll have 30 hours to complete your Social Action Project. Typically these could include public garden restorations, care home care packs, awareness campaigns etc.

Celebration- Celebrate your graduation along with parents and other guests. A final opportunity to celebrate what you have achieved and receive a certificate signed by the Prime Minister.

The cost is just £50 for the whole summer programme. In some cases this may be subsidised.

TACKLING RURAL ISOLATION

Most people feel lonely now and again - but for a worrying number of older people, the feeling of loneliness can be overwhelming and have a damaging impact on their wellbeing.

Devon HIGHLIGHTS is led by Devon Communities Together and is the result of a partnership bid with members of the Devon Senior Voice Network, The Creativity Centre Educational Trust (CCET) and Ageing Well Without Children. It aims to improve the quality of life and physical and mental wellbeing of older members of the community who are experiencing, or at risk of, loneliness, and will support the start-up and sustainable development of new, local place-based group activities that respond to the needs and desires of local participants.

Half a million older people go at least five or six days a week without seeing or speaking to a single person. (Age UK 2016, No-one should have no one)

The project is funded by the National Lottery's Community Fund, the largest community funder in the UK, and H.M. Government's Building Connections Fund, a partnership between Government, The National Lottery Community Fund and the Co-op Foundation which was set up in response to the Jo Cox Commission on Loneliness to support projects that prevent or reduce loneliness.

The first Highlights group was launched in Chulmleigh, North Devon, and throughout 2019 the project will also reach out to other areas of Devon including Totnes, Torbay,



Paignton, Holsworthy, Exmouth (Littleham) and Teignmouth.

Grants of up to £200 will be available to the groups to support projects that can help individuals, communities and local services to connect together to tackle loneliness.

Two fifths of all older people say that the television is their main company (Age UK, 2014).

One of the main difficulties with combating loneliness is overcoming the stigma surrounding it. Of the millions of people in the UK who are lonely, almost two thirds feel uncomfortable actually admitting to it (British Red Cross and Co-Op, 2016). Someone who is lonely will often struggle to reach out for support, and older people are even less likely to ask for help. One of the biggest challenges is engaging with local people who are experiencing loneliness, or most at risk of it.

To reach the right people, we need the support of local organisations and services already working in the community. Local "connector" organisations and volunteers can help us by promoting the opportunity, identifying and encouraging "at risk" individuals to join, providing information and advice to the group, and participating in a local steering group.

The Voice for Devon's Countryside

swallowed up by sprawling new housing estates, the Devon branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England appears to be a lone voice urging major housebuilders and planners to keep Devon special. In a county so heavily reliant on tourism, are we sacrificing the very qualities that make Devon such an attractive place to visit and live?

CPRE Devon is an independent, environmental charity (part of the CPRE network) which campaigns to shine a spotlight on the impact of new housing, one of the most pressing issues threatening Devon's countryside. We are the only non-political, non-aligned organisation tracking and challenging inappropriate development across the county.

The fact that there is a need for more new homes is not in question. An in-depth study we commissioned last year from a leading research organisation established that. However, the report "Devon Housing Needs Evidence' clearly showed that we are building more houses than needed, often the wrong type of homes in the wrong places, and that the majority are neither sustainable nor affordable to local people.

APPLEDORE COMMUNITY LAND TRUST

Supported by DCT's Rural Housing Enablers to create a stunning affordable housing scheme for local people, it's no surprise that Appledore Community Land Trust (CLT) was the 2018 winner of the Devon Rural Housing Award.

The CLT worked tirelessly for almost a decade to provide affordable rented housing for local people in Appledore. The three CLT directors, all born and bred in the parish, bought the sea-view site with their own money nine years ago, as there were so few suitable sites available in the village.

They faced many challenges in bringing the scheme to fruition, including the slope of the site, which meant high costs in groundworks (levelling, retaining walls etc). There were also problems with access to the site. After two housing associations were unable to make the scheme financially viable, Aster Group stepped in.

All of the barriers were overcome with the hardwork of the CLT and the help of DCT's Rural Housing Enablers. Appledore finally has a development of new homes, all of which are for local people who are not in a position to rent or buy in their community.

This will allow Appledore to become a more inclusive community as people on low



incomes will be able to stay living locally with the add-on benefits that they will support the school, local clubs and societies and boosting the economic viability of local businesses.

In April 2019, DCT was pleased to welcome Tim Goodship, Head of Rural Policy at Defra, to view the new homes as a shining example of a community-driven initiative creating positive change for local people.
